




*I use gel food coloring as it is stronger than regular food dye.

Black Birch (or Yellow Birch) Tea Recipe:

*Adapted from "The Outside Story"

You can make a very nice wintergreen-flavored tea from peeled black or yellow birch twigs! Recommended method: gather a few quart-sized, wide-mouth Mason jars and fill them with lukewarm water. Using a carrot peeler or pocket knife, peel about three or four dozen birch twigs. Add as many peeled twigs and peelings to the jars as possible. Put lids on jars and let them rest for a day or two. Enjoy!
